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NOTES - EADS COMMUNITY (RICHMOND) CEMETERY AND SEWARD CEMETERY (Pages 73-74, 139-141)

The Commercial Appeal, 4 Jan. 1970: "Metropolitan Scene - Tiny Eads Has Mysteries In Past ... the post office run by Mrs. Hazel Seward ... the Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis Railroad ran through the ... town ... Connell's Store ... sold everything from cradles to coffins ... Mike Richmond whose store and antique shop on Highway 64 (had) new information from Mr. Jimmy Seward ... one of the grandsons of the founder. The only other living here is Mr. Tommy Seward. Mr. Jimmy said their grandfather hired a surveyor to divide the land and then gave it to his children. The engineer was T.C. Owens. He was paid three lots for his work, and may have been the one who suggested the name - it's supposed to be that of the man who designed a bridge over the Mississippi River at St. Louis ... Mr. Richmond's mother, Mrs. Charles Richmond, has lived in Eads since 1919 ... Mrs. Fanny Laura Seward Brockwell of Memphis ... working with two other Seward descendants ... family genealogy ... "There is a question of spelling," said Mrs. Brockwell, "but I think Cargile is acceptable." Cargile B. Seward subdivided the land ... In addition to T.L. Seward there are two granddaughters living ... Mrs. Joe Crook of Raleigh and Mrs. Ola Owen of Crenshaw ... Robert Hume, public affairs officer for the Memphis District of the U.S. Engineers, offered the following ... James B. Eads, 1820-1887, designed the Eads (Continued on Page 279)
